Furthermore, Xi's praise for Hungary's "independent" foreign policy and his advocacy for a "global community of shared future" in Serbia reflect his attempt to influence Europe's ideological and strategic alignments. This approach challenges the Western-centric geopolitical order and positions China as a leader in a multipolar world, where smaller nations can counterbalance traditional powers.
